

Stop the Dramatic Cuts and Federal Weaponization of CoC Funding,
Putting Over 170,000 People at Risk of Homelessness

In a change expected to put more than 170,000 Americans at risk of experiencing

homelessness, <u>Politico reported</u> that HUD is planning to make dramatic cuts to the FY25 Continuum of Care (CoC) Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO). Now that the shutdown is coming to an end, we expect to see the CoC NOFO released. Your advocacy has already made an impact: <u>all 3 NJ Republicans Congressmen</u> signed onto a letter urging HUD to renew the existing CoC grants. <u>Tell Congress to stop the cuts of life-saving homeless</u> <u>services funding and hold HUD accountable to their promised 2-year funding cycle!</u>

# NJ Coalition to End Homelessness Adds Caution to Governor Mikie Sherrill's Congratulations

Following Governor-elect Mikie Sherrill's decisive victory, Coalition CEO Connie Mercer congratulated the new administration while issuing an urgent call to prioritize the state's homelessness crisis. Mercer noted a 57 percent rise in homelessness over the past three years—more than 13,700 New Jerseyans are unhoused on any given night—and warned that proposed federal cuts could double unsheltered homelessness by 2026. "The stakes could not be higher—but neither could the opportunity," Mercer said. "With

# SNAP Funded in NJ Through November But Future Payments Remain Uncertain

After days of delay caused by the ongoing federal government shutdown, more than 800,000 New Jersey residents finally received their November SNAP benefits following a federal judge's order for the Trump administration to release the funds. While the payments bring temporary relief, uncertainty remains for December as the shutdown continues, leaving families and food banks under strain. State and local agencies, along with nonprofits, are mobilizing to provide emergency food assistance, with Governor Phil Murphy accelerating \$42 million in grants to support food programs statewide.



Scutari Bill Establishing Municipal
Homelessness Trust Fund and
Housing Plans Advances

New legislation sponsored by Senate President Nick Scutari (S-4832) would allow New Jersey municipalities to create homelessness trust funds and adopt local homeless housing plans to better address the state's growing homelessness crisis. The bill aims to give towns sustainable funding and strategic tools—using revenue from existing fines and penalties—to invest in affordable housing, support services, and prevention programs. Scutari said the measure empowers local governments to respond effectively as homelessness in New Jersey has risen nearly 24% since 2023.

Congress Must Extend the ACA
Subsidies or Expect a Crisis in NJ

As the federal shutdown drags on, New Jersey families face a looming crisis as expanded Affordable Care Act subsidies are set to expire, threatening to double premiums and push millions off coverage. Losing these subsidies would burden

students experiencing homelessness. Superintendent Justin Toomey explained how rising homelessness in Morris County has led to an increase in students placed in the district under the McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act, which guarantees every child immediate access to education regardless of housing status. Toomey outlined the district's legal obligations, including enrollment, transportation, and tuition responsibilities, emphasizing that unplanned student placements have created significant and unexpected budget challenges as multiple districts now share responsibility for children temporarily living in local hotels and motels.



## New Jersey Church's Proposed Homeless Shelter Still in Limbo After Zoning Meeting

Christ Episcopal Church in Toms River, New Jersey, is seeking approval to open a 17-bed homeless shelter, but the plan remains stalled after the zoning board postponed a vote amid opposition from neighbors and the mayor. The dispute intensified when the township proposed seizing the church's property by eminent domain to build a park, prompting widespread public backlash, petitions, and fundraising efforts. Supporters, including church leaders, remain determined to continue their outreach despite the uncertainty.

# Hudson County Warming Center Will Provide Relief from Cold Beginning on November 15

Hudson County will reopen its Kearny Warming Center from November 15, 2024, through March 31, 2025, to provide shelter, food, and medical services to homeless residents during the winter months. The center will remain open continuously during freezing conditions and will partner with Alliance Community Healthcare for on-site medical support. Transportation and access points are available across Jersey City, North Bergen, and Hoboken to ensure residents in need can reach the facility safely.

# <u>Trump Administration Expected to</u> <u>Drastically Cut Housing Grants</u>

The Trump administration is planning a major overhaul of federal homelessness policy that would cut long-term housing aid by two-thirds and redirect billions toward short-term

programs emphasizing work requirements, treatment mandates, and enforcement of camping bans. Critics warn the shift could force up to 170,000 formerly homeless people —many disabled and older—back onto the streets, while supporters argue it would better address root causes like addiction and mental illness. The plan also centralizes federal control over \$3.5 billion in homelessness grants, potentially reshaping how and where the money is distributed.





### After the Shutdown: What Everyone Needs to Know About the Upcoming NOFO

The Senate passed a short-term funding bill to end the record-long government shutdown and keep the government open through January, but it failed to include a key provision ensuring 12-month renewals for HUD's Continuum of Care (CoC) programs. While the House is expected to approve the bill soon, major funding delays and significant policy changes are anticipated, including caps on permanent housing funding, stricter scoring criteria, and penalties for organizations not aligned with new federal priorities. The Alliance warns these changes could lead to funding gaps, increased homelessness, and a redirection of HUD resources, and urges CoCs to prepare coordinated advocacy and contingency plans.



# <u>Unaffordable Housing Leaves</u> <u>People Homeless, Not Funding Cuts</u> THE HILL

The Trump administration's plan to cut funding for permanent housing has sparked debate among homelessness advocates. While critics warn it will worsen homelessness, others argue that the real issue isn't funding—it's the lack of affordable housing. Research shows that states building more homes, like Texas and Florida, have seen homelessness drop,



## <u>Civil Commitment and the</u> <u>Criminalization of Homelessness</u>

President Trump's July Executive Order, "Ending Crime and Disorder on America's Streets," connects homelessness to "vagrancy" and urges states to expand civil commitment programs, including screening unhoused individuals for the Sexually Violent Predator (SVP) program. This policy allows the federal government broad while high-cost states such as California and New York continue to struggle despite billions spent. The takeaway: solving homelessness starts with making housing more abundant and affordable.

discretion to indefinitely confine people labeled as "sexually dangerous," even without a prior sex offense conviction. Advocates warn it could deepen racial disparities, criminalize homelessness, and expand federal power under the guise of public safety.



Mary Kenion on Homelessness: Policy, Principles, and Solutions

In this interview with Mary Kenion, Chief Equity Officer at the National Alliance to End Homelessness, she emphasized that ending homelessness requires compassion, inclusion, and investment in affordable housing and healthcare rather than punitive or exclusionary policies. She criticized recent federal actions promoting involuntary institutionalization and rejecting the Housing First model, arguing they ignore research and risk harming vulnerable populations. Kenion called for renewed empathy and community, urging policymakers and citizens alike to view helping the unhoused as both a moral duty and a practical investment in society's wellbeing.

### **The 'Beyond Homeless" Blueprint**

The book Beyond Homeless: Good Intentions, Bad Outcomes, Transformative Solutions by Mary L. G. Theroux, Lawrence J. McQuillan, Ph.D., and others argues that decades of government spending and policies like Housing First have failed to resolve homelessness, instead worsening conditions in many communities. The authors claim that well-intentioned programs have produced ineffective results and call for evidence-based, transformative solutions that restore dignity, safety, and hope while bridging political divides.



<u>Tiny Homes, Big Impact for</u> <u>Struggling Veterans</u>

The Veterans Community Project (VCP), led by Marine veteran Bryan Meyer, builds into poverty, with about 7 million seniors now living below the poverty line. To address this, Reps. Raul Grijalva, Elissa Slotkin, and Jan Schakowsky introduced the Supplemental Security Income Restoration Act, which would modernize the outdated SSI program for seniors and people with disabilities. The bill raises benefit levels to the federal poverty line, increases savings and income limits, removes penalties for marriage and shared housing, and updates decades-old eligibility rules to ensure recipients can meet their basic needs with dignity.

tiny-home villages that provide transitional housing and support services for homeless veterans across the U.S. Each village offers case management, mental health support, and job training to help veterans regain stability and move into permanent housing —achieving an 85% success rate. Supported by community partners and praised by leaders like Wisconsin Gov. Tony Evers, VCP's model is restoring dignity and hope to thousands of veterans, demonstrating what compassion and practical solutions can achieve
